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The Nesius Foundation, Inc. Attachment to Articles of Incorporation Article III-Purpose

- 3.1 The corporation is organized exclusively for charitable and educational purposes and not for profit including:
- To act and operate exclusively as a nonprofit corporation pursuant to the laws of the State of Florida.
- To engage in any and all activities and pursuits and to support or assist such other organizations, as may be reasonably related to the foregoing and following purposes.
- To engage in any and all other lawful purposes, activities and pursuits which are substantially similar to the foregoing and which are or may hereafter be authorized by Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- To solicit and receive contributions, purchase, own and sell real and personal
 property, to make contracts, to invest corporate funds, to spend corporate funds for
 corporate purposes, and to engage in any activity in furtherance of, incidental to, or
 connected with any of the other purposes.
- 3.2 The Corporation shall have the power to conduct activities and engage in transactions incidental to the accomplishment of the above purposes, including the power to accept contributions, subject to the following limitations:
- No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be
 distributed to its members, directors, officers or other private persons, except that the
 corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for
 services rendered to the corporation and to make payments and distributions in
 furtherance of the purposes set forth above;
- No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of
 propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation and the corporation shall
 not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of
 statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office except
 as authorized under the most current Internal Revenue Code;

Notwithstanding anyother provision of these Articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (1) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law); or (2) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170(c)(2) of said Internal Revenue Code.

- 3.3 If the corporation is ever classified by the Internal Revenue Service as a Private Foundation, the following provisions will prevail:
- The corporation shall distribute its income for each tax year at such time and in such manner as not to become subject to the tax on undistributed income imposed by Section 4942.
- The corporation shall not engage in any act of self-dealing as defined in Section 4941(d).
- The corporation shall not retain any excess business holdings as defined in Section 4943(c).
- The corporation shall not make any investments in such manner as to subject it to tax under Section 4944.
- The corporation shall not make any taxable expenditures as defined in Section 4949(d).
- 3.4 Any reference herein to "Section" refers to a sections of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and to any corresponding subsequent federal tax laws.
