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**ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION
OF
PROJECT MAKEOVER, INC.**

In compliance with the requirements of Chapter 617 of the Florida Statutes, as amended from time to time (the "Florida Not for Profit Corporation Act"), and Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, including its Treasury Regulations, all as amended from time to time ("Internal Revenue Code"), the Articles of Incorporation of Project Makeover, Inc., a Florida not for profit corporation (the "Corporation"), hereby read as follows (these Articles of Incorporation are hereinafter referred to as the "Articles"):

**ARTICLE 1
NAME**

The name of the Corporation is Project Makeover, Inc.

**ARTICLE 2
PRINCIPAL PLACE OF BUSINESS AND MAILING ADDRESS**

The principal place of business and mailing address of the Corporation is:

**ARTICLE 3
DURATION AND COMMENCEMENT OF EXISTENCE**

The Corporation will have perpetual existence.

**ARTICLE 4
PURPOSES**

The Corporation is organized and will be operated exclusively for educational and charitable purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. In furtherance of such purposes, the Corporation is authorized:

(a) To promote, support, and engage in activities carried on for charitable purposes, by the direct conduct of such activities, and by making grants to other organizations engaged in charitable activities. The charitable activities to be conducted by the Corporation may include, but are not limited to, providing services to grade schools, including but not limited to, renovating and restoring the grounds of schools that serve lower income communities, donating resources that support those schools, and fundraising for said activities.

(b) To receive and maintain personal or real property, or both; and, subject to the restrictions and limitations set forth below, to use and apply the whole or any part of the income from such property and the principal thereof exclusively for charitable, educational, literary, or scientific purposes either directly or by contributions to other charitable organizations.

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(c) To receive assistance, money (as dues or otherwise), real or personal property and any other form of contributions, gift, bequest, or devise from any person or entity, to be used in the furtherance of the objects and purposes of the Corporation; to enter into agreements or contracts for contributions to the Corporation for its objects and purposes, provided that acceptance of gifts will be subject to the oversight of the Board of Directors as required by the Bylaws of the Corporation.

(d) To establish an office and employ such personnel as may be necessary and appropriate in the judgment of the Board of Directors, and pay reasonable compensation for the services of such persons.

(e) To distribute, in the manner, form, and method, and by the means determined by the Board of Directors of the Corporation, any and all forms of contributions or other funds received by it in carrying out charitable and educational programs of the Corporation in the furtherance of its stated purposes. Money and real or personal property contributed to the Corporation in furtherance of these objects and purposes are and will continue to be used exclusively for such purposes.

(f) To invest and reinvest surplus funds in such securities and properties as the Board of Directors may from time to time determine.

(g) To purchase, acquire, own, hold, guarantee, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge, loan, or otherwise dispose of and deal in any bonds, securities, evidence of indebtedness, or other personal property, as well as to purchase, acquire, own, hold, sell, transfer, mortgage, or otherwise dispose of and deal in real estate; and, as the owner of any such real or personal property, to exercise all the rights, powers, and privileges of ownership.

(h) To contract and be contracted with, and to sue and be sued.

(i) To adopt and use an official seal for the Corporation.

(j) To do all acts and things requisite, necessary, proper and desirable to carry out and further the objects for which this Corporation is formed; and, in general, to have all the rights, privileges, and immunities, and enjoy all the benefits of the laws of the State of Florida applicable to corporations of this character, including but not limited to the powers described in Section 617.0302 of the Florida Statutes, subject however to the requirements of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and to the other limitations provided in these Articles.

ARTICLE 5 MEMBERSHIP

The Corporation shall have no members.

ARTICLE 6 DIRECTORS

All corporate powers will be exercised by or under the authority of, and the affairs of the Corporation will be managed under the direction of, a Board of Directors. The number of Directors (not less than three) will be as provided in the Bylaws. The Board of Directors shall have five (5) Directors, and their names and addresses are as follows:

The terms for which the Directors are to serve, and the method by which the Directors are to be elected, will be stated in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE 7 COMPENSATION AND INDEMNIFICATION OF DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS

7.1 **Compensation.** A Director or officer of the Corporation may receive reasonable compensation for personal services rendered as a Director or officer, or in any other capacity, so long as the services are reasonable and necessary to carrying out the charitable purposes of the Corporation, and may be reimbursed for expenses or advances paid on behalf of the Corporation, provided they are reasonable in character and amount and approved for payment in the manner provided by the Bylaws. Provisions relating to compensation payable to Directors or officers of the Corporation will be stated in the Bylaws. Any such compensation shall be limited to reasonable compensation for personal services rendered to the Corporation, which services shall be reasonable and necessary to carrying out the charitable purposes of the Corporation.

7.2 **Indemnification.** Every Director and officer of the Corporation will be indemnified by the Corporation against all expenses and liabilities, including fees for legal counsel, reasonably incurred by or imposed in connection with any proceeding or any settlement of any proceeding (including any appeals) to which a Director or officer may be a party or may become involved by reason of being or having been a Director or officer of the Corporation, whether or not a Director or officer at the time such expenses are incurred, but only if (i) the Director or officer is not adjudged guilty of or liable for willful misfeasance in the performance of his or her duties, and (ii) in the case of a settlement before entry of judgment, the Board

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of Directors approves such settlement and reimbursement as being in the best interest of the Corporation. The foregoing right of indemnification will be in addition to and not exclusive of all other rights to which a Director or officer may be entitled by law. Appropriate liability insurance may be provided for every officer, Director, and agent of the Corporation in amounts determined from time to time by the Board of Directors.

7.3 Interest of Directors and Officers in Contracts. Any contract, whether for compensation or otherwise, or other transactions between the Corporation and (i) one or more of its Directors or officers, (ii) any firm of which one or more of its Directors or officers are shareholders, partners or employees, or in which they are interested, or (iii) any corporation, association, or partnership of which one or more of the Corporation's Directors or officers are shareholders, members, directors, officers, partners, or employees, or in which they are interested, will be valid for all purposes, despite the presence of such Director or Directors or officer or officers at the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Corporation which acts upon or in reference to such contract or transaction and despite his or their participation in such action. The fact of such interest must be disclosed to or known by the Board of Directors and the Board of Directors may, nevertheless, authorize, approve, and ratify such contract or transaction by vote of majority of the Directors present. This section will not be construed to invalidate any contract or other transaction which would otherwise be valid under the applicable common and statutory law. This provision is subject to modification by any conflict of interest policy adopted by the Board of Directors of the Corporation.

7.4 Prohibition Against Self-Dealing and Excess Benefit Transactions. Notwithstanding anything contained in these Articles to the contrary, the Corporation shall make no payment that would constitute "self-dealing" as defined in Section 4941 of the Internal Revenue Code, or that would result in an "excess benefit transaction" as defined in Section 4958 of the Internal Revenue Code.

ARTICLE 8 CHARITABLE LIMITATIONS

Despite any other provision of these Articles, the Corporation may not conduct or carry on any activities that are not permitted to be conducted or carried on by an organization exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. These restrictions, as provided in Section 617.0835 of the Florida Statutes, include, but are not limited to, the following:

8.1 No Private Inurement. No part of the net earnings of the Corporation may inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, the Directors or officers of the Corporation, or to any other private persons, except that the Corporation is authorized and empowered (i) to pay reasonable compensation for personal services rendered to the Corporation, so long as the services are reasonable and necessary to carrying out the charitable purposes of the Corporation, and to reimburse expenses or advances made for the Corporation that are reasonable in character and amount, and (ii) to make payments and distributions to persons who are qualified to receive them in furtherance of the Corporation's charitable purposes as set forth herein. All of the net earnings and assets of the Corporation will be expended for the purposes stated in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

8.2 No Political Activities; No Substantial Lobbying Activities. In accordance with applicable federal tax law, the Corporation shall not participate or intervene in any political campaign on behalf of, or in opposition to, any candidate for public office by publishing or distributing statements, or in any other way. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation.

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8.3 **Private Foundation Rules.** In the event that, and for so long as, the Corporation is characterized as a private foundation within the meaning of Section 509(a) of the Internal Revenue Code, the Corporation:

(a) shall make distributions for each taxable year at such time and in such manner as not to become subject to the tax on undistributed income imposed by Section 4942 of the Internal Revenue Code;

(b) shall not engage in any act of self-dealing as defined in Section 4941(d) of the Internal Revenue Code;

(c) shall not retain any excess business holdings as defined in Section 4943(c) of the Internal Revenue Code;

(d) shall not make any investments in such manner as to subject it to tax under Section 4944 of the Internal Revenue Code; and

(e) shall not make any taxable expenditures as defined in Section 4945(d) of the Internal Revenue Code.

ARTICLE 9 DISPOSITION OF ASSETS

If the Corporation is dissolved pursuant to the Florida Not for Profit Corporation Act, the Board of Directors, after paying or making provision for the payment of all of the liabilities of the Corporation, shall dispose of all of the assets of the Corporation by transferring such assets to any one or more organizations that are (i) exempt from tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and (ii) engaged in activities of the type described in Article 4 above, as the Board of Directors determines. Any assets not so disposed of will be disposed of by the Circuit Court of the county in which the principal office of the Corporation is then located, exclusively for such charitable purposes, or to such organization or organizations as that Court determines are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

ARTICLE 10 AMENDMENTS TO BYLAWS OR ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

The power to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal the Bylaws of the Corporation or these Articles is vested in the Board of Directors, in accordance with the provisions of the Bylaws.

ARTICLE 11 INITIAL REGISTERED AGENT

The name of the initial registered agent of the Corporation, who is authorized to receive service of process is Corporate Creations Network, Inc. The street address of the initial registered office of the Corporation is 11380 Prosperity Farms Road #221E, Palm Beach Gardens, Florida 33410.
