## TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Our firm was applying for a business loan this week and, thank goodness, found out from the loan company that our corporation had been dissolved on September 22, 2000. We immediately contacted your office and spoke to Michelle, who was very helpful and kind. She suggested that we send a letter outlining our unusual circumstances and enclose the \$300 check that we owe.

We are a very small human resources consulting firm with only three employees. I am one of the consultants, but because of our size, I also handle the accounting tasks for the company. Unfortunately, I was not aware that I should be expecting this report in January. We never received a thing in the mail to alert me, or it would have been taken care of right away. We would never want to lose our corporation status and I feel terrible about this whole thing.

We have had so many problems with our mail because we operate under the name of Seawright & Associates, instead of Cor-Com, Inc, and because we were asked to include "Suite C" in our address, although we had previously been told by the post office that this was not necessary. We met with the post office and even have a laminated notice on our mailbox to continually alert the mail carrier, but much of our mail has been returned. No doubt, this is what occurred with your January notice to us. Back in 1999, in hopes of alleviating any problem that might occur with the mail, I learned that our President requested that your office add "Suite C" to the address you have for us in your records. I don't know if this change was made, but if you like, we can provide you with a copy of the form where we noted this change.

By means of this letter, I am making a most humble request for you to please accept the \$300 payment for the reinstatement of our corporation status. As a small firm, it would be very difficult to pay the penalty—especially knowing we would never willingly ignore a bill that we owe. I feel so bad about this that I have asked my boss to deduct from my own paycheck, any penalty we might have to pay. Because of the mail situation, we just were not aware that we owed this.

Even though I hope that the address situation has been corrected at the post office and on your records, I marked my calendar for next January to keep a close watch out for your form. If I do not receive it in January, I will call your office right away.

Thank you very much for your kind consideration of our unusual situation. I am very sorry that this has happened and would appreciate your acceptance of our \$300 as payment in full for reinstating our corporation status.
