When the Commission on the Status of Women was established in 1951, it was charged with the task of studying the status of women in the United States and recommending ways to improve it. The Commission's report, "The Status of Women in the United States," was published in 1952 and is a landmark document in the history of women's rights. It identified many areas where women were being discriminated against and recommended that Congress and the courts take action to end this discrimination. The Commission's work was a major step towards the passage of the Equal Rights Amendment in 1971 and the passage of the Equal Pay Act in 1963 and the Civil Rights Act of 1964.
