





A WOMAN'S FORUM: EXPLORING WOMEN'S CANCERS (April 4)


Pickleball News


Feulner served on several commissions and task forces including the Gingrich-Mitchell Congressional Task Force on U.N. Reform (2004-2005) and the Congressional Commission of International Finance Institutions ("Meltzer Commission," 1999 - 2000). He was vice chairman on the National Commission on Economic Growth and Tax Reform ("Kemp Commission," 1995 - 1996) and was the U.S. Representative to the U.N. Second Special Session on Disarmament, where he delivered the final U.S. address to the General Assembly (1982).

"(Mr. Feulner) has helped to shape the policy of our Government," wrote former President Ronald Reagan in the Presidential Citizens Medal citation awarded to Feulner in 1989. "His has been a voice of reason and values in service to his country and the cause of freedom around the world."

Meese headed Reagan's transition effort following the 1980 election and served as chief of staff and senior issues advisor. He then became counselor to the President. In 1985 Meese became the 75th U.S. Attorney General, and held the office until 1988. Meese currently is a distinguished fellow and center chairman at the Heritage Foundation.

Feulner and Meese are guests of Lee and Sally Klinetobe.

BOOK REVIEW

"The Widow of the South"



Author Robert Hicks brilliantly blends fact and fiction to capture the end of an era, when the vast madness of war and the courage of a remarkable woman unrolls against a backdrop of the Civil War.

Carrie McGavock is a widow whose Carnton Plantation in Franklin, Tennessee saw one of the bloodiest battles of the war with 9,200 casualties. Her home was comandeered by the Confederate Army for use as a hospital, and when the soldiers died, they were buried near the plantation. She corresponds



with families of the dead to provide relatives with knowledge about the boys they've lost and wears black in memory of them all.

Later, when the field's owner threatens to plow over the makeshift cemetery, Carrie reburies the soldiers -- more than 1,500 -- at her plantation.

While all this, including Carrie, are historical truth on which Hicks builds the narration, he shows perfection in the blending of fact and fiction as
